Slept but little. Spent up  
most of the night so anxious  
to be ready for first train  
with much difficulty we  
took car 6 A.M. Came 21  
miles to Stewartville where  
4 passenger and baggage car

Savior when he went into  
the Temple & drove out the buyers  
and sellers & they took it  
brimly

At our good friend Davidson  
He is better getting little sleep which  
is quite encouraging I am  
almost well  
This my birth day I was born  
Jan 16 1795 so I am 69 years old  
how many penills and dangers  
through which I have passed  
I pray God to pardon the sins  
and follies of the past year and  
give me grace to honour him
